

In 2005 I put the cartoons I created into a small spiral bound booklet titled "Spring Chickens".





The first cartoon I remember drawing was in High School. It was of a man holding a undecorated scraggly Christmas tree that nobody in their right mind would buy. Inside


the card, I drew a picture of the tree decorated.






3. Cartoons of my daughter, Tara Zoe and my brother, Edward




'The Bad Humor Man' was another of Ed's ideas I put to sketch.

4. Life Planning, Teaching, and English As A Second Language



The process was a stretch for many and could become quite taxing, so I created several cartoons to use in Life-Planning sessions to lighten the load and make it more enjoyable.



And you don't have to have a PhD to discern 'Important Life Questions', or attend a 'Rocket Scientist Convention' to learn all the things you need to figure out.










Answer: 'None of the above!'

in the middle in Guido Caducci.


I probably also used the 'Budgie Jumper' and 'Luigi moves 10 Miles From Home' to highlight some other measurement concepts I was explaining.








5. Truths and Frustrations


I created several cartoons to reflect various 'truths' in life. 'Work is For People Who Don't Know How To Fish' is one.




And 'Cigaretts Lifetime Guarantee' is another!




6. Life in Crested Butte, Dogs, and Scottsdale



In the Fall, the highways are thick with hunters packing enough gear to build a small town. The elk see them coming and 'Maude and Ralph Travel' out of town.








'How to make God laugh' is a cartoon I frequently used in the Life-Planning workshops.







I made sure I was inclusive in my Easter greeting.




At Halloween I created cards sending wishes to 'Every Bunny' and drew a card that depicted a variety of human faces that reminded me of pumpkins.






I created the '<u>Toasting Chess Players</u>' to make the receiver ponder and work for the complete message.






...and I left the 'L' out of a card to send another hidden Christmas message.



For Valentine's Day I gave a clear warning:




Or, I would write a special message on the heart I constructed in the desert... I might even send a little poem.






My 'Olympic Hearts' Valentine's Day card would send a strong message of love, especially when the USA was competing in the Olympics.

When someone did something nice for me I would send them a note: 'Many Tanks'. Or, if they were celebrating a special event I would suggest they go 'Tie One On'.














Eddie 'two shoes' makes a move on Sally!

I continued the saga with these two cartoons






Eddie-Two Shoes built platforms for Sally so they can dance check to check!


Lucky for him, before he asked Bertha to jitterbug, Eddie-Two Shoes learned that she hates men!

This one I created of 'Alvin Training his Son' makes me laugh.


